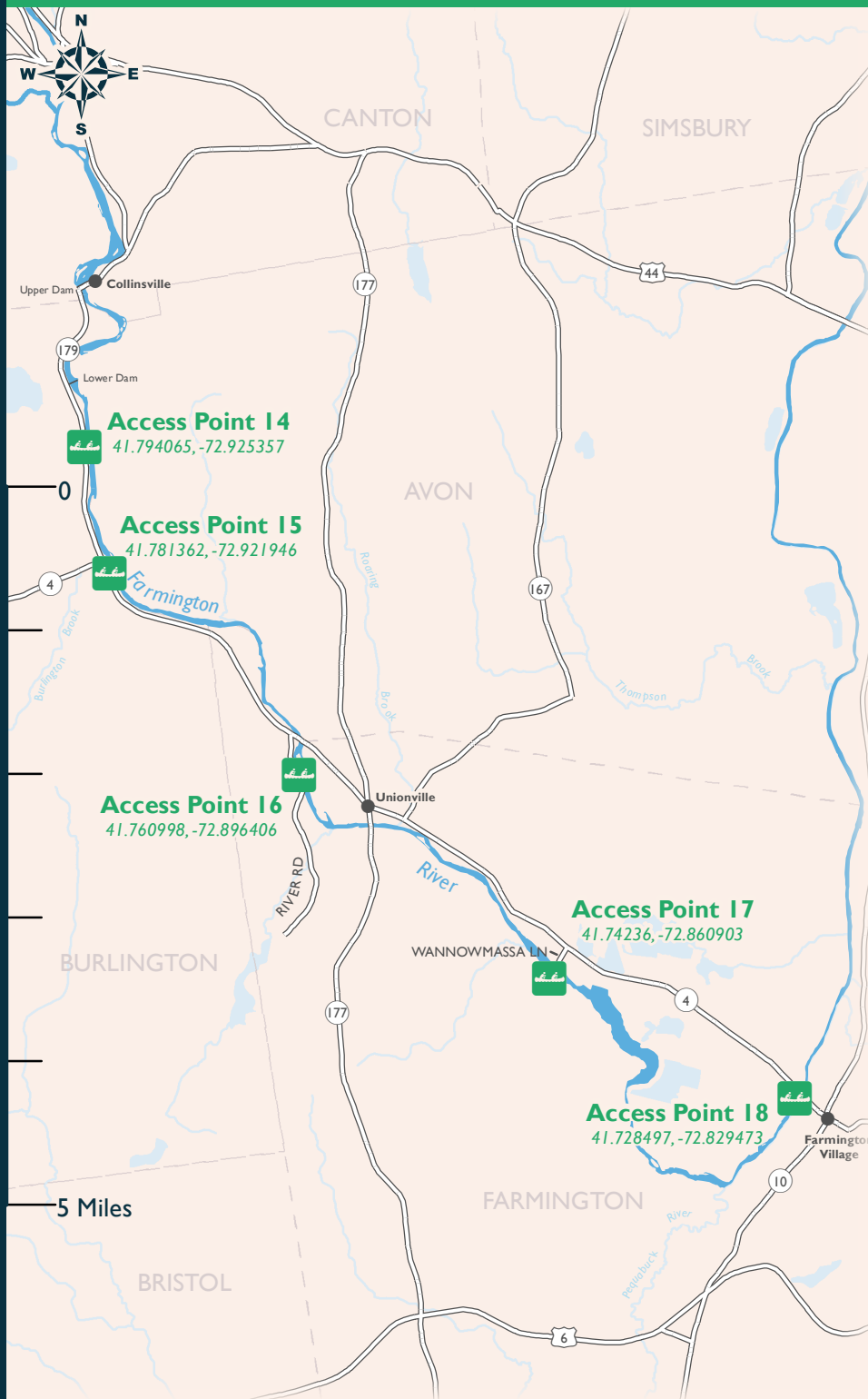

Boating Information

| Towns | Canton, Avon, Burlington & Farmington, CT |
| Tributaries | Bunnell Brook, Burlington Brook, Roaring Brook, Pequabuck River |

PUT-IN: Access Point 14, "Wide Spot", Rt. 179, Burlington, CT

Directions: Traveling from Rt. 179 bridge in Collinsville, follow Rt. 179 south 1.1 miles. Park along the long turn-off on the left.

Access Point 15
Junction Rt.4/179, Burlington, CT

Directions: Traveling east from traffic light at junction, take first left to the paved parking lot for the Farmington River Trail. River access is located just above the bridge over Burlington Brook and near the cul de sac at the end of the parking lot.

Access Point 16
River Road, Unionville, CT

Directions: At the western end of Rt. 4 bridge in Unionville, turn onto River Road (Miniature Golf Course/Antique Store). Proceed .3 miles to turnout on left.

Access Point 17
Wannowmassa Lane, Farmington, CT

Directions: Travel 1.6 miles south on Rt. 4 from Unionville center. Turn right onto Wannowmassa Lane, at the car wash, just before crossing under the old railroad bridge. Follow road to the access area.

TAKE-OUT: Access Point 18
Rt.4 Bridge, Farmington, CT

Directions: Travel 0.2 miles west on Rt. 4 from the stoplight at Rt. 10, in the center of Farmington. Cross the bridge and take an immediate left into a driveway leading to a large handicapped friendly parking lot.

Description: The majority of the route is a series of Class II drops and pools and one should have good boating skills to negotiate the rapids. The scenery is rural and lush.
